

MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL HELD WITHIN THE COUNCIL CHAMBER ON MONDAY THE 9th DAY OF MAY, 1910 AT 8 O'CLOCK, P.M.

His Worship Mayor May presiding and all the Aldermen present excepting Alderman Schultz.

Mr. Floyd, Fish Merchant, complained of Chinamen being allowed to sell fish throughout the City without first taking out a license in accordance with the Transient Traders Bylaw. The Mayor intimated that instructions would be given to have the provisions of the Bylaw fully enforced.

Reports and recommendations by the Finance (General, Police and School Trustees), Board of Works, Water Works, Fire and Light and Public Health Committees on due accounts were submitted and read to the meeting and the Treasurer was authorized to pay accounts to the amounts following, vis:

A letter was read from City Engineer Hanes submitting a sketch Plan of proposed siding to be constructed by the B.C. Electric Railway Co. on Queensbury Avenue between 15th and 16th Streets which met with his approval. On motion of Alderman McNeish seconded by Alderman Irwin the Plan was passed by the Council.

Letter from City Engineer Hanes in reference to the proposed B.C. Electric grade on Fell Avenue from Keith Road to 17th Street and stating that he approved of same if the grade shown on the profile and staked out on the ground was the grade of the tops of the rails. Mr. Perry who was present stated that he would furnish Council with definite information at next meeting.

On motion of Alderman Irwin the City Clerk and City Engineer were instructed to take the next steps necessary to proceed with Local Improvements requisitioned for.

The Finance Committee recommended that a Special Meeting be held next Friday evening to prepare and consider the Estimates for the current year. On

motion of Alderman McRae seconded by Alderman McNeish the Committee's recommendation carried.

The Water Works Foreman was instructed to see to the placing of all water taps necessary in the Grand Boulevard and Ottawa Gardens.

Referring to the sad news received of the death of King Edward VII, Alderman Irwin moved that a message of deepest sympathy be forwarded to the Dowager Queen and other Members of the Royal Family and that this Council do now adjourn from its labors. The motion was seconded by Alderman McRae and agreed to.

On motion of Alderman Schultz instructions were given to have the City Hall properly draped in respect of his late Majesty.
