Pursuant to the Provisions of Section 11 of the Municipal Act Amendment Act, 1934, received from the Inspector of Municipalities approval of Bylaw 1384 entitled "North Vancouver City Sinking Fund Reduction Bylaw 1934."

23rd Approved the holding of Ridgeway School Sports at Mahon Park on Friday, June 8th next.

Met the Municipal Committee of the local Board of Trade in connection with various outstanding civic problems.

25th Received information from the Provincial Administrator dealing with the grub staking of prospectors together with advice on the application recently made on behalf of the Red Cross Society concerning a clothing contribution for distribution amongst those in need on the North Shore.

Mr. Valentine proceeded to Victoria in connection with the general administration of Unemployment Relief.

- 26th The Ferry Superintendent submitted proposed new time schedule, which he recommends to become operative when the Second Narrows Bridge is reopened.
- 28th Considered question of Ferry fares and the disposition of the vessels' crews in relation to the adjustment necessary at the time of the reopening of the Second Narrows Bridge.

A series of twenty Mining lectures now completed and the box of mineral specimens for the lectures transferred by direction of the Department to the Principal, Vancouver Technical School.

29th Conferred with the Fire Chief regarding a reduction in the operating cost of the Fire Department.

New lift span of the Second Narrows Bridge was successfully floated in position this P.M. It is confidently expected that the bridge will be opened for traffic in about 2 or 3 weeks time with the former tariff prevailing for passengers and vehicles.

- 31st On behalf of the regular crew the Secretary of the Local Fire Fighters Union accepted the re-organization proposals to work shorter time on a remuneration basis of \$90.00 per month. This move has been rendered necessary by financial stringency.

The following staff changes are to become effective July 1, 1934. On account of ill health Mr. C.D. Jermyn's application to retire from service on superannuation on June 30th next has been granted.

Constable J. Park retired from service at June 30, 1934.

Constable M.G. Grahame placed on full time service from July 1, 1934 instead of the present part time basis.
