Minutes of the Statutory meeting of the Council, held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Tuesday, January 2nd 1951 at 8 p.m. Present

His Worship Mayor F. R. Goldsworthy, Alderman M.F. Aldous, Alderman C.W. Cates, Alderman K.H. Gostick, Alderman J.C. McDevitt, Alderman A. Stewart and Alderman J.A.S.Suttis.

The Clerk reported that Alderman Aldous, McDevitt and Suttis / had taken the necessary declarations as required by the "Municipal Act" and the "Municipal Elections Act."

MINUTES

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the Minutes of the Regular meeting of the Council held on December 18th 1950 and the Minutes of the Special meeting held on December 20th 1950 be taken as read and adopted, copies of same having been given to all members of the Council. Carried

His Worship then delivered the following address and recommended the following Committees and appointments for the year 1951:-

"We start this new year of 1951 with a feeling of confidence and assurance that the foundation of our City has been constructed on very firm ground. We look forward to a year of great encouragement and pride, ever remembering that only well-informed public opinion can bring about peace and happiness and that nothing succeeds like success. May we as a Council foster the principles of free enterprise, freedom of individuals, and a stronger and better community spirit.

I wish to extend at this time a very warm welcome to our new member, Alderman Monty Aldous, and to congratulate Alderman McDevitt and Alderman Suttis on their re-election. The recorded vote is certainly an indication of public confidence in your ability and the people's thanks and their approval for you to carry on, and make decisions on their behalf.

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May I at this first meeting take this opportunity to
express to our civic officials and department heads the
sincere thanks of the past Council for their loyalty and
tolerance.

While not wanting to unduly alarm our people by speaking of Civil Defence, nor to start the New Year with fear, I do believe that the time has now arrived for the finalizing of the Civil Defence plan. Much work and thought has been given to this very important subject as to its effect on the North Shore. The underlying principle of Civil Defence is self-protection by the individual, which extends to mutual self-protection of communities. Within a few weeks arrangements will be made with the other local North Shore municipalities for a meeting to finalize a plan, and for the appointment of the appropriate operating officials.

As the people's elected representatives it is our duty and responsibility to formulate intelligent and workable policies so that the Department heads and their staff may carry out such policies without "fear or favour" for the good and welfare of our people.

It is quite safe to say that the City's financial position is better now than it has been for over twenty years. This improved condition is attributed directly to the very fine assistance and co-operation with the Provincial Government. With the title of the Second Narrows Bridge coming back very shortly to the Bridge Company, of which the City and District are the principal bondholders, we can look for substantial financial assistance in the future; and with the proposed sale of the Second Narrows Bridge to the Canadian National Railway the City can look for a rapid industrial development.

The cost of operating our City, like all other costs, is increasing - with increased wage demands, higher maintenance costs, and general increased overall expenditures. While these increases are considerable we can look forward to a year with a greatly increased Board of Works budget from the source of revenue mentioned before. Because of this bright outlook in our future I am more concerned than ever before with the Committee created two years ago known as the LEGAL, POLICY & CIVIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE, which must be further accelerated to formulate long term policies of Construction of Permanent Roads, Sidewalks, Sewer Extensions, amenoep etc. This same Committee will act as a reference committee Jan 15/51 and will gather information on all manner of municipal practices and procedures which will be of great benefit to the other Committees of Council. In view of the vast amount of work and many problems facing us and the very necessary policies to be written for guidance of our department heads, I would recommend that the Committees meet for this coming year on the second and fourth Monday of each month at 7 o'clock in the City Hall; and would further suggest that the meetings be open to the public for the purpose of discussing their problems with the Committees between 7 and 8 o'clock. facilitate the Committee meetings this year, I suggest dividing the Council into two groups with a separate Chairman for each Committee.

His Worship asked that as many of the Council as possible attend, on the above date.

From Helicopter Exploration Co. Ltd., applying for right of way through certain City owned lots in the Lynn Creek Watershed for the purpose of developing certain mineral claims in the watershed.

Mayor Goldsworthy said the matter of logging or mining operations in our watershed was of great concern to the Council and he felt that careful consideration should be

given to such applications.

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Gostick that the above request be referred to the Legal Committee for consideration and that in the meantime Mayor Golds-worthy and Alderman Stewart, Chairman of the Water Committee be appointed to point out to representatives of the above Company the City's attitude on matters of this kind which would affect the purity of the City's domestic water supply. Carried

From the District of North Vancouver advising that the District has not made any Agreement for logging operations in the Lynn Valley area adjacent to the watershed but that a conference will be held shortly with the Minister of Lands and Forests relative to certain property in the Mount Seymour Area, and that representatives from the City could attend such conference.

Mayor Goldsworthy said that there is some confusion in our minds as to the lands affected by the District's proposed Municipal Forest programme but advised that the Commissioner had assured him that there would be no logging in the Lynn Creek watershed area and that the Commissioner would recommend to his incoming Council that no such logging be permitted.

It was agreed that Mayor Goldsworthy and Alderman Stewart would attend the forthcoming conference with the Minister

of Lands and Commissioner Sowden.

From the District of North Vancouver, asking if the District could use the City Council Chamber on January 9th and 23rd in view of the interest being shown in the forthcoming District elections by ratepayers of that Municipality.

Moved by Alderman Cates, seconded by Alderman Stewart that permission be granted to the District of North Vancouver to use the City Council Chamber on January 9th and 23rd for the purpose of holding District Council meetings. Carried

From F. G. Patterson, on behalf of St. Andrew's United Church asking if the City could improve the condition of the side-walks on the streets bordering church property at the corner of 10th and St. George's.

Referred by His Worship to the Board of Works Committee for a recommendation.

The meeting was adjourned at 8.30 p.m. to allow the press to take pictures of the newly elected Aldermen.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Alderman Gostick reported that members of his Committee had met with the School Board to discuss the latter's extraordinary requirements for the year 1951. His Committee agreed with the Board that the new construction should be commenced as soon as possible. He pointed out that our share is available from Tax Sale Lands Reserve. He advised however that the allocation of the costs of such construction should be made on the basis of the 1951 assessment and not on the 1950 figures as laid down by the Department of Education. He suggested that the Council should agree to pay our share of the extraordinary estimates provided the apportionment of such estimates is based on the requirements as laid down in the "Public Schools Act."

RECOMMEND that the Council accept this City's share of the 1951 Extraordinary Estimates of School District No. 44 as arrived at under the provisions of the proper Statutes providing for such apportionment.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the above recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Carried

Alderman Gostick reported that tax collections had been very good in 1950 and that an all time high of \$460,148.00 or 92.5% of the levy had been collected. This was \$33,867.00 over the amount collected in 1949 and although the percentage of collections in 1949 had been slightly higher being 92.9.

The collection of arrears had also been higher than estimated,

a total of \$40,000.00 instead of \$20,000.00 as estimated for.
The arrears at the end of 1949 amounted to \$60,000.00. The splitting up of the Trade licenses and Pound Department had worked out satisfactorily. A total of \$41,200. was collected in Trade licenses or an increase of \$4500.00 over last year.

worked out satisfactorily. A total of \$41,200. was collected in Trade licenses or an increase of \$4500.00 over last year.

Alderman Gostick advised that the City's Reserves had been maintained and stood at \$290,000.00 at the end of 1950 as compared with \$273,030.00 at the end of 1949. He pointed out that we have made certain commitments recently to cover our 1951 waterworks programme but the above comparison of Reserves was as shown on December 31st 1949.

Alderman Gostick advised that his Committee was recommending that a Census card be mailed out to all householders and such card would be remailed by the householder to the City Hall in a self-addressed envelope. The information on the cards would show the number of pre-school children, the number of school children, number of children under 18 not attending School and the number of adults and would be of great use for School purposes and for Civil Defence purposes. He pointed out that the Federal census figures for 1951 would not be available until early in 1952. The cost of the proposed card system would be \$225.00.

RECOMMEND that the Council approve of the spending of \$225.00 for the purpose of conducting a census of all persons living in the City of North Vancouver.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman McDevitt that the above recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Carried

BOARD OF WORKS COMMITTEE
Alderman Suttis advised that as he was now leaving the active field of the Board of Works Committee he wished to express his thanks to his Committee members and to the Superintendent and Staff for their very fine co-operation during the past year.

FERRY & TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

Alderman Cates advised that he had no report to make but would like to thank the members of his Committee and Ferry Staff 2 for their co-operation and support during the past year and he wished Alderman McDevitt every success and offered co-operation on Ferry matters during 1951.

FIRE & PARKS COMMITTEES

Alderman Stewart advised that he was very happy at his changeover to the Waterworks and Industrial Committee. He hoped that the new Chairman of the Fire, Light and Parks Committee 3 would enjoy the work of these Committees as much as he had and he said he knew the new Chairman will have every co-operation from the Fire Chief and his staff during the coming year. He pointed out that consideration will have to be given shortly to the appointment of a new Chief upon the retirement of Chief Murphy.

MOTIONS

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Suttis that 4 Alderman K. H. Gostick be appointed Acting Mayor for the year 1951. Carried

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Stewart that 5 this Council be appointed to act as a Court of Revision of the 1951 Assessment Roll, the first sitting to be held on February 8th 1951 at 9 a.m. Carried

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman McDevitt that the Treasurer be authorized to issue the 1951 Ferry Pass list making the necessary alterations where personnel has been changed during the past year. Carried

Alderman Gostick advised that there was a resolution on the Minute Books of the Corporation tying down the sum of \$25,000.00 for sidewalk purposes and that the Corporation wished to 7 have this money released for general Works and Waterworks use. It would be necessary therefore to reconsider and rescind such resolution.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the portion of the Resolution of the Commissioner sitting as a Council passed on December 14th 1943, and setting aside a portion of the reserve funds amounting to \$25,000.00 for sidewalks purposes, be reconsidered. Carried

Referred by His Worship to the Labour Relations Committee.

The Clerk submitted the Annual Report of the Building Department for the year 1950.

Ordered received and filed and copies furnished to each member of the Council.

The Clerk reported receiving certificates that By-laws No. 2008, 2009, 2010, 2012 and 2013 were now registered in the County Court, Vancouver.

Ordered received and filed.

Moved by Alderman A. Stewart, seconded by Alderman McDevitt that the City of North Vancouver Reserve Expenditure By-law 1951, No. 1," be introduced and read a first time. Carried Whereupon the By-law was read a first time.

Alderman McDevitt reported that the Heywood Community Centre were not agreeable to allowing the Salvation Army the use of the Centre building on Sunday but he suggested that the 1951 Committee might lease the Centre building for Community Centre purposes for six days and that some arrangement might be made to allow the Salvation Army to use the building on Sunday.

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Suttis that this matter be referred to the 1951 Legal and Policy Committee.

Carried.

The next matter which was referred to the 1951 Council was the request of the North Vancouver Police Revolver Club to establish a Revolver and Rifle Range in the basement of the / Lonsdale Hall.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman McDevitt that this be now referred to the 1951 Building Committee. Carried

The next item which was referred to the 1951 Council was the request of the North Vancouver Lawn Bowling Club for a new roof for its Clubhouse.

Moved by Alderman Cates, seconded by Alderman McDevitt that this request be now referred to the 1951 Building Committee. Carried

ANY OTHER COMPETENT BUSINESS

Alderman Aldous advised that he was very happy to be a member of the Council team and while he would not score any goals in the near future he would not at the same time be content to sit on the bench.

Mayor Goldsworthy advised that a copy of the Procedure Bylaw would be given to Alderman Aldous and it would not take him long to understand the various procedures of the Council.

Mayor Goldsworthy advised that while he and Alderman Gostick had been appointed as Directors of the Burrard Inlet Tunnel and Bridge Company in the list of appointments which had been adopted by the Council this evening the Solicitor had pointed out that the Mayor by reason of his office was a Director of such Company and that in the case of Alderman Gostick a formal resolution would be required.

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Cates that Alderman Kenneth H. Gostick be and is appointed a Director of The Burrard Inlet Tunnel and Bridge Company. Carried

Mayor Goldsworthy reported that the Hospital Board is going ahead with the construction of a small addition to the East end of the Hospital building for the accommodation of children. The addition will be a two or three storey building depending on finances. He pointed out that the Board may find it necessary to come to the City and District for financial aid although the Hospital has certain funds which it can contribute to such construction.

He advised that Reeve Fletcher of West Vancouver did not think that that Municipality would join in with North Vancouver as there had not been a sufficient majority of the voters in favor of such a step. Reeve Fletcher had promised however, that his Council would appoint a Committee to give early consideration to the Matter so that it can make a decision as to whether or not West Vancouver should build its own hospital or come in with the North Vancouver General and that such decision would be made within three months.

Mayor Goldsworthy advised that the North Vancouver General Hospital Board had extended permits to the West Vancouver Doctors to carry on in the Hospital until January 31st 1951.

Doctors to carry on in the Hospital until January 31st 1951.
Alderman Gostick advised that the Board was now recommending again that the Hospital be incorporated as a Society a step which the City Council had agreed to several years ago when West Vancouver was also to make a financial contribution to the construction of a new wing. The Board he said feels that extra beds are required now and that it cannot delay further.

The Board also felt that greater public support would be available if the Hospital was under a Society management rather than owned by the Municipalities.

than owned by the Municipalities.

He felt that he would like the Council's approval of the principle of transferring to a Society so that the City's representatives would be in a better position to discuss the matter at the Board meetings.

Mayor Goldsworthy reported that the Solicitor had drawn up an Incorporation agreement several years ago and that it would be necessary if the Hospital assets were leased or deeded to the Society to put the matter to the electors for a vote. He suggested that this could be done at the same time that a vote is held on the matter of the conveyance of the Second Narrows Bridge to the Canadian National Railway.

Alderman Gostick agreed that the assets of the Hospital could be leased to a Society instead of turning over the

assets wholly to a Society.

Mayor Goldsworthy suggested that we should give West Vancouver a little more time to consider this very vital question and the Solicitor agreed in the meantime to commence preliminary work and study in the matter of incorporation.

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the Council adjourn.
Whereupon the Council adjourned at 9.15 p.m.

This letter was ordered laid over to the end of the meeting for the Solicitor to draft the necessary resolution, appointing a Proxy for the City.

From the Community Planning Association of Canada enclosing resolutions dealing with blighted areas, housing projects, technical assistance on new sub-division and layout, and agricultural zoning, passed at the recent Conference of the Association and now submitted to the various municipal councils in British Columbia for consideration.
Referred by His Worship to the Building Committee for

consideration.

From the North Vancouver City and District Property Owners Association advising of a resolution passed by the Association suggesting that the City carry out a progressive program of sewer extensions from year to year.

Alderman McDevitt pointed out that this organization would shortly be splitting up into separate groups - one representing the City and one representing the District, and that possibly this letter should be received and filed in the meantime.

Alderman Gostick pointed out that the Policy Committee is proposing to lay out a plan of systematic sewer construction this year.

His Worship referred this letter to the Legal and Policy Committee for a recommendation.

From the North Vancouver Business Association asking for financial and other assistance in stopping the Park Royal q free bus service.

Alderman Gostick doubted that the Association as a whole had endorsed the request contained in the letter.

His Worship referred this letter to the Transportation Committee for consideration.

From the North Vancouver General Hospital advising that the Board has passed a resolution expressing a desire that the hospital be turned over to a Society, pointing out that the City and District's legal liability would then cease and possibly voluntary help in financing might be more easily secured.

Alderman Gostick pointed out that he understood that Council / was in agreement with the desire of the Hospital Board - it was just a matter of the details having to be worked out.

Mayor Goldsworthy pointed out that the City Solicitor some time ago had prepared a draft agreement for the formation of a hospital society but at that time, West Vancouver was considering becoming a member of the society and putting up the money for a new wing for the hospital.

The Solicitor agreed to prepare a draft copy of such an incorporation for study by the Council.

King to purchase Lots 1, 2 and 3, Resub. 1, Block 19, D.L. 548 be approved, provided the applicant is agreeable to cancelling the interior lines of these lots and bears the expense of such cancellation. Carried

PETITIONS

The Clerk submitted a petition addressed to the Engineer from owners in the area near Fell Avenue, Dudley Road and Westmoreland Crescent, asking that the surfacing of Dudley Road and Fell Avenue be carried out in 1951. The petitioners complained that heavy logging and building supply trucks have damaged the roads considerably.

His Worship asked the Superintendent of Works whether

logging trucks were using these lots.

The Superintendent replied that no permission had been given and he would check the situation tomorrow.

The Petition was referred to the Board of Works Committee for consideration.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Alderman Suttis reported that the Finance Committee had given further consideration to the matter of controlling dogs in the City and it was felt that it would be better to try and enforce the provisions of the Dog Tax and Pound By-law, rather than attempt to classify the dogs as to size for licensing purposes as agreed at the Council meeting on May 1, 1950. RECOMMEND that the recommendation of the Legal and Policy Committee adopted on May 1st, 1950 providing for the classification of dogs for Licensing purposes be reconsidered.
Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman Gostick
that the above recommendation of the Finance Committee be Carried adopted.

RECOMMEND that the recommendation of the Legal and Policy Committee adopted on May 1st, 1950 providing for the classi-5 fication of dogs for Licensing purposes be rescinded. Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman Gostick that the above recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Carried

RECOMMEND that the Dog Tax By-law be amended to provide that the license fee for female dogs be increased to \$5.00 annually. Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman Gostick that the above recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Carried.

Alderman Suttis advised that the Poundkeeper will be instructed 1 to enforce the control provisions of the Dog Tax and Pound By-law and especially the section prohibiting the running at large of dogs between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.

LEGAL AND POLICY COMMITTEE

Alderman Gostick reported that his Committee had considered the application of Joseph Chew Shingle Company to lease or purchase portion of Parcel Z, D.L. 271 and had received a report from the Reference Committee concerning this matter. He advised that in view of the fact the C.N.R. is making an industrial survey we should be cautious about selling any industrial lands. The particular parcel now under consideration may also be required for highway purposes.

His Committee therefore recommends as follows: / RECOMMEND that the application of the Joseph Chew Shingle Co. Ltd., to lease or purchase a portion of Parcel Z, D.L.271 be not granted, as the Council wishes to hold all such industrial sites pending the C.N.R. survey and also because this particular lot may be of value for future highway pur-

poses.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Aldous that the above recommendation of the Legal and Policy Committee be adopted. Carried

Alderman Gostick reported that apparently there was some misunderstanding by Staff Sergeant MacAndrew as to the procedure for reporting broken street lights to the B.C. Electric To clarify this situation, his Committee therefore recommends as follows:

RECOMMEND that the Police Department be asked to advise the B.C. Electric Company each morning of any street lights that 2 have been reported out the previous evening and in the case of lights which are out for over forty-eight hours that the Police Department advise the City Clerk so that he can report the same to the Company in accordance with the provisions of the Street Lighting Agreement and further that citizens be asked through the Press to report any street lights which are out, to the Police Office.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Aldous that the above recommendation of the Legal and Policy Committee

be adopted. Carried.

Alderman Gostick advised that his Committee had considered the tender of R. F. Gardiner to purchase the former library building at 16th and Lonsdale for \$60.00 and had also received a report from the Building Inspector advising that it would cost the purchaser about \$232.00 to move the building and rehabilitate it in a new location for garage purposes. ther a new building would cost approximately \$300.00 to 3 build.

His Committee therefore recommends as follows:-RECOMMEND that the tender of Mr. R.F. Gardiner, 1717 Grand Boulevard of December 19, 1950 to purchase the former library building at 16th and Lonsdale and remove the same for the sum of \$60.00 be now accepted.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Aldous that the above recommendation of the Legal and Policy Committee be adopted. Carried

POLICE COMMITTEE

Alderman Gostick reported that the complaint of Mr. Bert Marcuse, 1312 Grand Boulevard of speeding on the Boulevard had been referred to the Police Department.

His Committee recommended as follows: -# RECOMMEND that Mr. Bert Marcuse, 1312 Grand Boulevard be advised that his complaint of speeding on the Boulevard has been drawn to the attention of the Police Department.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Aldous that the above recommendation of the Police Committee be adopted. Carried

Alderman Gostick advised that the Police Committee had studied the proposed 1951 policing contract with the R.C.M.P. and it was found that after taking all feasible expenses 5 into account the cost of the 1951 contract would be \$28,804 as compared with the 1950 contract of \$35,154.00. He said that his Committee felt that it was a good contract and therefore recommended as follows:-

RECOMMEND that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign and seal with the Corporate Seal the 1951 Policing Contract with the Minister of Justice of Canada and the Attorney General of British Columbia, providing for the policing of this City for the year 1951, in accordance with the letter from the Commissioner of December 9th, 1950 and with the contract enclosed therewith.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Aldous that the above recommendation of the Police Committee be adopted. Carried

FIRE, LIGHT & PARKS COMMITTEE

Alderman Aldous reported that there were a number of matters under consideration by his Committee but it was not prepared to report at this time.

BOARD OF WORKS COMMITTEE

Alderman Cates advised that his Committee had considered the request of the St. Andrews United Church for better sidewalk facilities. He said that his Committee felt that all similar public buildings should have good sidewalks adjacent to them and was considering the situation from an over all viewpoint.

In the meantime his Committee recommended as follows:
RECOMMEND that the Rev. F.G. Patterson of St. Andrew's United Church be advised that his request for sidewalks on the Streets adjoining the Church will be considered at the time the Preliminary Estimates are being prepared.

Moved by Alderman Cates, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the above recommendation of the Board of Works Committee be

adopted. Carried

Alderman Cates advised that his Committee had considered the request of petitioners for a sidewalk on the south side of 6th Street between Ridgeway and Moody Avenues. RECOMMEND that the petitioners for a sand and shale sidewalk on the south side of 6th Street between Ridgeway and Moody Avenues be advised that their request has been referred to the 1951 Preliminary Estimates.

Moved by Alderman Cates, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the above recommendation of the Board of Works Committee be adopted.

Alderman Gostick felt that shale sidewalks were not a good investment and were always the cause of many complaints after they were installed.

Alderman Cates said that the Superintendent does not feel very enthusiastic about them but they are useful to a certain extent.

The Superintendent was asked to give his views regarding shale sidewalks. Mr. Greenwood advised that personally he did not approve of them but where there is no access at all and where money is not available for more permanent type sidewalks and where the alternative is to leave the area without any form of sidewalks then the shale sidewalks have some benefit to those people in that area. Aside from this he pointed out that it is a matter of Council policy as to whether they should construct this type of sidewalk at all. He pointed out that the shale sidewalks are very economical compared to the other type, being simply rock dust placed on the most economical grade possible.

Mayor Goldsworthy pointed out that the recommendation now before the Council is that this matter be referred to the 1951 Preliminary Estimates for consideration along with requests for similar sidewalks in other areas.

The motion being put, the same was carried unanimously.

Alderman Cates reported that his Committee had considered the request of the North Vancouver Police Revolver Club to use the basement of the Lonsdale Hall for small bore rifle and revolver range. His Committee felt that in view of the use being made of the upstairs of this building that the request of the Revolver Club could not be granted.

RECOMMEND that the North Vancouver Police Revolver Club be advised that the Council does not consider the Lonsdale Hall a suitable place for a Rifle Range and regrets therefore, that their request cannot be granted.

Moved by Alderman Cates, seconded by Alderman Stewart

that the above recommendation of the Board of Works Committee

be adopted. Carried

Alderman Cates advised that the Superintendent wished to have the Council consider the possibility of installation of traffic lights at certain intersections on Lonsdale Avenue.

Mayor Goldsworthy advised that the installation of such lights had been recommended by the Police Department some time ago in their monthly reports to the Council. RECOMMEND that the Superintendent of Works include in the Preliminary Estimates the installation of Traffic Lights (Stop and Go) on Lonsdale Avenue at Esplanade, 3rd, 13th and 15th Streets.

Moved by Alderman Cates, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the above recommendation of the Board of Works Committee be

adopted. Carried

Alderman Cates advised that his Committee had considered the request of Mr. James Moore that 4th Street West be opened up. He pointed out, however, that there is no water service to the lots owned by Mr. Moore and the policy of the Council is to improve its existing roads before opening up new roads. 3 RECOMMEND that Mr. Moore be advised that the Council regrets that it cannot see its way clear to open new roads at the present time as it is felt that it is necessary to expend what money is available on the improvement of existing roads.

Moved by Alderman Cates, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the above recommendation of the Board of Works Committee be

adopted. Carried

FERRY & TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

Alderman McDevitt reported the following traffic figures for the ferries for the month of December as compared with the same month last year.

> Passengers <u>Vehicles</u> 106**,9**28 7,541 9,786 1950 147,254 1**9**49

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Gostick that the above report of the Ferry Committee be adopted.

Alderman McDevitt advised that his Committee had had a meeting with officials of the B.C. Electric Company. Company, he said is very concerned with a drop of 30,000 passengers monthly on its local lines. This drop he advised is not just a local condition but is being experienced in traffic services all over Canada and the U.S. pany had, he said, certain changes it wished to propose which would be of help to the Company and an advantage to our citizens.

Firstly, the intercity bus arriving at 15th and Lonsdale would go down Lonsdale to the bus terminal and would leave the bus terminal and return to 15th, then go back to Van-couver along its original route. Ten minutes later the second intercity bus would arrive at 15th and Lonsdale and from there would follow the Grand Boulevard route arriving at the Ferry Terminal. This bus also would reverse its route to 15th and Lonsdale and would then continue over the intercity route to Vancouver.

The Company advised that if this plan was adopted there would be no waiting periods either at 15th and Lonsdale or Esplanade and Lonsdale. Local riding will be permitted on the intercity routes.

Secondly, Alderman McDevitt advised that the Company wished to have its Capilano route travel along 3rd Street from Lonsdale Avenue to Marine Drive instead of following a route up Mahon Avenue and down Keith Road.

Alderman McDevitt advised that he was very much interested in providing good bus service regardless of the Ferry system, but he felt also that the fact that all of the buses will be brought to the bus terminal might have some beneficial effect on the Ferry operation.

Mr. Sutcliffe of the B.C. Electric Railway Company was present and gave further information regarding the proposed changes. He was asked if the changes in the Grand Boulevard bus would disturb the accuracy of its meets with the Ferries.

Mr. Sutcliffe advised that he thought the Company could guarantee just as good a connection on the new routes as they had in the past, as the running times had not been changed, only the layovers being eliminated. He advised however, that the Company wished the Council to give consideration to the situation on the Fell Avenue service which is a double head service from the terminal to the foot of Fell, one bus going on to Capilano and the other proceeding up to the top of Fell. There is, he said, very little traffic between the foot of Fell and the top of Fell and he wanted to get the Council's reaction as to whether or not some alternative method could be devised in view of the decline of passengers carried.

Mayor Goldsworthy asked if the Company would lay this matter over pending possible changes and diversions in some of the highways connecting with Fell Avenue. He felt that possibly after these changes had been greed on that it would be easier to deal with the Fell Avenue bus line.

Mr. Sutcliffe agreed to lay this matter over.

The latter then pointed out that one other change which would affect the City would be that the Lynn Valley double head buses would be split, one of the buses going down Lonsdale to the Ferry terminal and the other being turned at 15th and Lonsdale and reverse its route back to Lynn Valley. He said that keeping this extra bus off of Lonsdale would help the present congestion at intersections in the lower part of town. Those passengers at Lynn Valley desiring to go down to the Ferry terminal could, if they were on the bus which stopped at 15th and Lonsdale, transfer to the other bus going down to the foot of the hill. He said that there was ample capacity on the latter bus to take care of all passengers wishing to go to the Ferry Wharf.

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the change in the Lynn Valley bus route outlined by Mr. Sutcliffe of the B.C. Electric Railway Company be approved. Carried.

Moved by Alderman McDevitt, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the Council also approve of the changes in the intercity bus route and the Capilano bus route as outlined by Mr. Sutcliffe of the B.C. Electric Railway Company at this meeting. Carried Mr. Sutcliffe promised that plenty of time and publicity would be given to local passengers before making the changes in the service.

NEW BUSINESS

The Clerk submitted a notice from the Victorian Order of Nurses 5 advising of its Annual Meeting in St. John's Memorial Hall, 200 Block West 13th Street on January 18th at 2.30 p.m. Received and filed.

The Clerk submitted an invitation from the Hollyburn Aerial Chair Lift to attend the opening of the lift on January 17th at 2 p.m. His Worship asked any members of the Council desiring to attend this opening to advise the Clerk as soon as possible.

An application was received from Robert H. Payne, 309 West 2nd Street for permission to erect a temporary shed for boat

building purposes.

Moved by Alderman Gostick, seconded by Alderman Stewart, that permission be granted Robert H. Payne to erect a temporary shed as requested providing that he will sign an undertaking to indemnify the City against any damages as a result of his moving the fishing boat over City roads to the inlet. Carried

The Clerk submitted the report of the Electrical Inspector 2 for 1950.

Referred to the Building Committee for consideration.

The Clerk submitted the report of the Ferry Superintendent 3 for the year 1950.

Referred to the Ferry Committee for consideration.

The Clerk submitted a letter from the Minister of Municipal Affairs approving of the disposition of the proceeds from the sale of Lot 15A, Block 139 and Lots 1A and 28A in Block 140, D.L. 274, for improving a waterway adjacent to the said lands.

Ordered received and filed.

BY-LAWS
