The Clerk reported that Alderman Bryan, Alderman McMillan and Alderman Suttis had taken the Oath of Allegiance to Her Majesty the Queen and had also made the Declaration required by Section 86 of the "Elections Act."

MINUTES

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Johnson that the Minutes of the Regular meeting of the Council held on December 15th 1952 at 8 p.m. and of the Public Hearing of the Council held on December 22nd 1952 at 7.25 p.m. and of the Special Meeting of the Council held on December 22nd 1952 at 8 p.m. and of the Special Meeting of the Council held on December 29th 1952 and of theSpecial Meeting held on December 31st 1952 be taken as read and adopted, copies of same having been given to all the members of the Council. Carried

Mayor Goldsworthy then addressed the Council as follows: -

"At this inaugural meeting of the City Council for 1953, 1 wish to extend a warm welcome to our new member, Alderman Mel Bryan, and to congratulate Alderman Thomas McMillan on his election and re-entry into our City Council, To Alderman Suttis, may I say your re-election is an indication of public confidence in your ability and I believe the people's approval of the past Council's administration.

It is customary at this time of the year in setting up the various Committees to outline the programme along which we shall work. However, this year we shall deviate somewhat from this arrange ment and give the members of the various Committees, particularly the two new Councilmen, a chance to

Committees, particularly the two new Councilmen, a chance to study their Departments and future requirements, past accomplishments and proposed plans for the current term. Some time in the near future, possibly in early February, we shall gather together and from the proposals evolving from the familiarization study by the various committee members, we should then be in a position to formulate policies for each Committee which will be to the maximum advantage of the City at the lowest possible cost consistent with our requirements for industrial development and the growth of the City, bearing in mind that the keynote of a sound economic future for our community lies in industrial and commercial development, such as our Councils, Board of Trade, Junior Chamber of Commerce and various Industrial Development Committees have worked towards.

There are a number of different services in the City and District of North Vancouver which have common problems and which could possibly be handled to advantage by joint commissions or committees at the policy level. This includes Police, Fire, Parks and Waterworks. A complete study of these various services should be made and suitable recommendations could then be brought down, making for the most efficient handling in the interests of North Shore residents. It has been proposed that we consider a Joint Committee to handle all aspects of Industrial Development for the North Shore, not only as situations arise, but also for future industrial potentialities.

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1952 brought many problems to the Council. The problem of protecting our watershed from logging and mining interests is still with us, and while we have made no permanent progress, we have managed to restrain operations within the watershed area.

The first stage of the Second Narrows Bridge and C.N.R. development plan has been successfully completed as far as the Bridge is concerned, and the second phase was consummated on January 1st 1953 with all harbour railway trackage being taken over by the C.N.R. This means the C.N.R. now has its lines in North Vancouver and the Railway is in a position to start on its next phase of North Shore development.

The question of Hospital Expansion has been a weighty and vexing one with many problems arising that had to be settled. To relieve the overall congestion and alleviate a critical situation a single story wing will be added to the N. E. side of the present hospital. The plans for this have now been fully approved and the West Vancouver Council has contributed \$15,000.00 to the cost. This new wing will accommodate the Children's Ward and the Radiologists Dept., leaving the vacated spaces in the main building for adult ward patients. The new main wing planned for the hospital will be located west of the existing main building, with the plans and drawings completed this year, and possibly the first unit being started in 1954. With the completion of this new main wing over a period of years the Hospital would have a capacity of 500 beds. The refusal of the Government to meet budgets of the

The refusal of the Government to meet budgets of the Hospitals of the Province will result in a deficit <u>definition</u> operation of the North Vancouver General Hospital which will have to be met by the City and District of North Vancouver.

The School Board has made a very excellent showing with much progress during the past year. The demand for accommodation is still growing and additional funds will have to be supplied for new classrooms for the fall of 1953.

The installation of a new sewerage outfall has been completed east of Lonsdale, giving the City two main trunk outfalls, placing us in a position to add new residential laterals to the trunk lines, so that eventually all or nearly all of the City residences may be connected to sewers.

With the conclusion of this my inaugural address 1 wish to take this opportunity of wishing each and every member of this Council and their families a most successful and happy New Year of 1953, as a forerunner of many more to follow.



v of North Vancouver on the Board of Management of the North Vancouver General Hospital. Carried

CORRESPONDENCE

From Mrs. J. Gillies, 258 West 14th Street; Mrs. Evelyn Turvey, 802 Roosevelt Crescent; Mrs. R. Harrison; and Mr. C. K. Guild on behalf of Canada Safeway Limited and Super-Valu Stores submitting letters in opposition to the passing of the Meat Markets Early Closing By-law now before the Council for final reading.

Delegates were present.

Mr. Duffus of the Super-Valu Store was then permitted to speak to the Council. He said he wanted to emphasize the Continent wide trend towards Friday night shopping. He said this trend was found to be popular in Vancouver and most of the adjoining

Municipalities. He pointed out that people can get out Friday evening, that the 5 day work week gives the family a chance to relax on Saturday and Sunday. He said that a petition had been placed in his store so that those who wished to oppose the Early Closing By-law could sign same and during the last 10 days well over 200 names had been placed on the petition. He said he thought that the proposed By-law would be a bad thing for North Vancouver and that it was a sad state of affairs when a few shop owners could dictate the shopping needs of many.

Mr. Crawford representing Safeway was present and spoke to the Council giving reasons why his Company is against the proposed By-law. He said there are two Safeway Stores in North Vancouver and that 29 of the 33 employees live on the North Shore. He said that during the last few years residential areas have opened up. There are more cars in use and it is a great convenience for a shopper to take his car and shop on a Friday evening. He said that this trend to night shopping was continent wide. He said that in Vancouver when they opened on Friday evening they were amazed at the favourable receiption by the x shoppers. He said that his point was that a move to curtail the Shopping hours is a move against present shopping trends. He advised that his Store also had made available petition forms for those who wished to oppose the curtailment of the Meat Shop hours and the petition contained 1266 names - 500 of which were received on Friday evening and the rest during the other shopping periods.

The petitions were then handed to the Clerk.

Mr. Crawford asked why should people be forced to make another trip to the store in order to purchase their meat supplies. Mr. Crawford then referred to the pleasant relationship between his Company and the Employee Unions and stated that night opening does not mean additional night hours for these employees. He said that there is a large volume of business in North Vancouver and that it is increasing and his Company would like to give good service to the many shoppers. He also did not think that 15 butchers should compel 15,000 people to obey their will. **90CCX**

Mayor Goldsworthy thanked the speakers and said that the position of the Council has been discussed and considered for a long time and he was fully aware of the legal position. He said that three names had been withdrawn from the original petition of the Meat Store Operators for 5:30 p.m. closing and then these three had asked that their names be replaced on the petition. He said that the Council had actually extended over the 60 day period allowed in Section 5 of the "Shops Regulation Act" but this had been through no fault of Council. He advised that the Council should now pass this By-law for Early Closing as it had no alternative. He pointed out that the present By-law as it now stands is under Section 4 of the "Shops Regulation Act" being initiated by the Council and therefore can be withdrawn by the Council at any time in the future without any petition from anyone. He said that he wished that there was some way out of the situation but he said that he did now know of any; however the proposed Bylaw should be passed and then may at a future date be withdrawn by the Council. He said that the butchers are aware of this and are also fully aware that the By-law is going through without his approval.

Two ladies and a gentleman in the audience also spoke in favor of Friday night shopping and asked the Council to give consideration to their request.

Mr. George Barlow spokesman for the Meat Store Operators pointed out that the 15 independent butchers have found that opening on Friday nights has killed Saturday business. He said that these independent butchers have lived here for many years and that they are entitled to reasonable hours of work.

Discussion followed, with Alderman Stewart pointing out that in his opinion those opposing the passage of the present By-law should have brought up their counter-petition earlier and Alderman Copping expressed the opinion that the Council must, under the Law, pass the present By-law and would be in a position to reconsider the whole matter again in the future.

Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman Stewart that the above letters and petitions with respect to this matter be received and filed. Carried

From the International Association of Fire Fighters, Local 914 advising that it wishes to discuss an increase in salaries for 1953.

Referred to the Labour Relations Committee.

From Mr. Claude Parker, advising that he has terminated his employment with the S. P. C. A., but is willing to carry on as the City Pound man if the Council wishes. Referred to the Finance Committee for consideration.

From the City of Trail, advising that it is dissatisfied with ^V the increase in costs of Policing by the R.C.M.P. Referred to the Police Committee.

From James Moore, 1185 Burnaby Street, Vancouver, applying to exchange Lot 27, Block 244, D.L. 544 and Lot 9, Block 205, D.L. 545 for City lots 62 and 63, Block 235, D.L. 546.

Referred to the Finance Committee for consideration.

From N. Nicholson, 264 West 27th Street, complaining of the condition of 27th Street from Chesterfield to Jones Avenues Referred to the Board of Works Committee.

Letters were submitted from Cyril R: Cunningham, Mrs. Ella E. Jessup, and Jean B. Carlisle, protesting against any vdevelopment of Block 216 as a Shopping Centre.

Referred to the Legal Committee on the understanding that in the meantime the Clerk will advise the writers of the legal situation with respect to Block 216.

From Staff-Sgt. Hooker, advising that a Coroner's Jury on December 6th 1952 on the death of Mrs. Margaret Davidson, 3 expressed the opinion that steps should be taken to improve

the lighting on our main thorofares. Moved by Alderman Copping, seconded by Alderman Stewart that this matter be referred to the Light Committee for consideration. Carried

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Mayor Goldsworthy said that there were several Committee matters which should be dealt with to-night.

HEALTH COMMITTEE

Alderman Johnson said that the City is responsible for ap- pointing someone as Treasurer of the Union Board of Health this year.

FINANCE COMMITTEE .

Alderman Suttis advised that in 1952 the City had purchased several new cars instead of making mileage payments and also had, at that time, authorized the construction of a garage to house these vehicles. He said however, that it had not been possible to do so last year and it was imperative that suitable housing be provided from the weather as soon as possible.

Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman Copping that the Superintendent of Works be instructed to construct a six car garage on the City Hall grounds as soon as possible at an estimated cost of \$2200.00, the actual cost to be included in the 1953 estimates. Carried

BOARD OF WORKS COMMITTEE

Alderman Copping advised that the Bridge at the foot of Bewicke Avenue is in very poor condition and if not repaired immediately will likely break down. It was therefore necessary to authorize the Superintendent of Works to go ahead with this work as soon as possible.

Moved by Alderman Copping, seconded by Alderman Bryan that due to the fact the bridge at the foot of Bewicke Avenue at the Home Oil plant is in such bad state of repair that it will either have to be closed or immediately repaired, therefore BE IT RESOLVED that the Superintendent be authorized to proceed with the reconstruction of this bridge immediately; the estimated cost of which is \$4000.00 the money for this work to be included in the 1953 Estimates.

Moved by Alderman McMillan, seconded by Alderman Johnson that the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to execute the necessary Bank resolution to authorize Alderman J. A. Suttis to sign cheques and other documents during the absence or the illness of Mayor Goldsworthy. Carried

The Clerk submitted a letter from the Secretary of the Burrard Tunnel and Bridge Company, enclosing a form of proxy for the meeting of the Shareholders of the Company to be held on January 12th 1953.

CORRESPONDENCE

From the Grand Boulevard Area Ratepayers Association, asking that local By-laws and the "Grand Boulevard Restriction Act" be amended to prohibit the use of homes on the Grand Boulevard for the accommodation of more than one family.

Mayor Goldsworthy said this matter had been before the Courts and that first of all the Court had decided that Mrs. Fielding, the Plaintiff, could not have her lots restricted from the "Grand Boulevard Restriction Act." However he said she won her right to be heard and recently Judge Coady had ruled that Mrs. Fielding's Lots 4, 5 & 6 in Block 103, D.L. 550 are not covered by the Act and she can convert her home into suites.

Mayor Goldsworthy said that in the first instance the Council sponsored the renewal of the Act in the Legislature and he said it was therefore necessary now for the Council or someone else to have the Act amended so as to prevent homes being used for such purpose on the Boulevard. In meantime he said Mrs. Fielding's lots have been removed ln the from the restriction contained in the Act and are subject only to whatever City By-laws might apply.

Mayor Goldsworthy said that a delegation from the above Association want to meet the Council to-night for the pur-pose of asking that our own By-laws and the Grand Boulevard Restriction Act be amended to take care of the situation.

At this point a delegation from the Grand Boulevard Area

Ratepayers Association entered the Council Chamber. In reply to a question the Clerk advised that homes which were constructed prior to November 5th, 1951 in the Single Family Dwelling areas may be converted for the use of more than one family, provided the City's By-laws are complied with and when the alterations have been approved by the Building Inspector and the Architectural Control Committee of the City Council.

Mayor Goldsworthy pointed out that an application could be made by Mrs. Fielding or anyone else on the Boulevard for permission to alter their homes for multi-family use and the Architectural Control Committee would have to vote on the application. He said he was sure that the delegation would like to know the Council's feelings in this regard.

Mr. R. S. Davis, spokesman for the Association reiterated the three requests of his Group as set out in its letter to Council. He pointed out that Justice Coady in making his decision said he was not basing his opinion on the intent of the Act but purely on the legal aspect.

Discussion followed The Council gave assurance to the delegation that it would do its best to prevent any single family homes on the Grand Boulevard being altered for the purpose of using them for the accommodation of more than one family.

Moved by Alderman Johnson, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the Solicitor be asked to prepare an amendment to the Grand Boulevard Restriction Act to remedy the present situation which allows certain houses on the Boulevard to be altered and used for the accommodation of more than one family. Carried

The delegation then left.

From the Industrial Development Commission, advising that the City's share of operating expenses for the year 1953 will be \$784.00.

Moved by Alderman McMillan, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the request of the Industrial Development Commission for a Grant of \$784.00 from the City for the year 1953 be referred to the 1953 preliminary Estimates, for consideration.

Alderman Suttis said that since the Council has joined in the operation of the above Commission it has been felt that the work of the Group has been very worthwhile. He said that the financing of our participation can only be handled by referring this matter to estimates but he would like to say at this time that he thought the Commission should be advised that we will be participating in the Commission's work again this year.

Commission's work again this year. Alderman Stewart said that he was sure that Alderman McMillan would let the President of the Commission know of our feelings in this regard.

The motion was then put and carried.

Mayor Goldsworthy said he had known of this proposal for some time. He said the Council had been in touch with the owners of the building but they seem to be undecided as to whether they will sell it or not. He said however, that when we were considering the possibility of using the building for a public auditorium it had been decided to have the Building inspector and an Architect make a thorough inspection of the structure to ascertain its condition. He said that 1

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the findings of the Inspectors showed that it would cost too much to put it into proper shape even if the building were obtained at the price around \$12,000. Referred to the Building Committee to study after con-

Referred to the Building Committee to study after considering the reports of the Building Inspector and the Architect.

From the Lower Mainland Regional Planning Board, asking the Council to reconsider its previous decision not to participate in the work of the Board and advising that if the City joins in the Board's work this year, its share of the cost of operation would be \$467.00.

Mayor Goldsworthy referred this matter to the Finance Committee and the Industrial Development Committee for study and report. He said he was sure now that we should become a member of this Board although he was not of that opinion at the inception of the Board.
