<u>CORRESPONDENCE</u> From Mr. A. D. MacInnes, Chairman, Debt Retirement Fund, requesting payment in the sum of \$100.00, as out-of-pocket expenses incurred as a result of the Board's operation.

Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman McMillan that the request of Mr. A. D. McInnes, Chairman of the Debt Retirement Fund be referred to the Minister of Muni-cipal Affairs for approval, pursuant to Section 33 of the City of North Vancouver Debt Refunding Act. Carried

From the Poppy Fund Committee of Canadian Legion, Branch 118, requesting that November 6, 1954, be proclaimed as ² "Poppy Day".

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Suttis that Mayor Cates be authorized to proclaim November 6, 1954, as "Poppy Day" in the City of North Vancouver. Carried

From Seaboard Advertising Co. Ltd., requesting permission to erect two illuminated poster panels on the north-east 5 corner of 18th Street & Lonsdale Avenue.

Moved by Alderman McMillan, seconded by Alderman Copping that this application be referred to the Building Committee and the Building Inspector for report. Carried

From the B. C. Electric Railway Co. Ltd., requesting a change in routing on the Capilano bus route during the winter 4 months.

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Copping that this request be referred to the Transportation Committee to consider in conjunction with the District of North Vancouver officials. Carried

From Beacon Supplies Ltd., 107 West Esplanade, and the North Vancouver Land & Improvement Co. Ltd., requesting that the lane allowance at the rear of their premises be kept free of parked cars, other than those permitted by the owner or tenant of the property.

Discussion followed.

Alderman Stewart said that there was quite a hazard created by the congestion of cars in this area. He said they are parked back to back. He said he thought the Legal Committee should instruct the Police to remove these vehicles.

After discussion, Mayor Cates suggested that these re-quests be referred to the Legal Committee. He said this is a condition which has been going on for some time. He said it might be a question of defining the limits of the lane.

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Alderman Stewart suggested that a check should be made on the use of the lot formerly occupied by the Elks Building. He said that a great number of cars are packed into this area as well, creating quite a hazard. ONIEU

From Savage & Keith, Solicitors, on behalf of their clients, Messrs. Cawsey & Roach, claiming damages as 3 the result of their having cleared property which they alleged had been shown to them when they pur-

chased Lots 43 & 44, Block 136, D.L. 274. Moved by Alderman McMillan, seconded by Alderman Copping that this letter be referred to the Legal Committee for consideration. Carried

From Evans, Coleman & Evans, complaining of the damage caused by sawdust and wheat chaff to the paint work on the swimming pool of Mrs. J. Pattison, First & St. Davids Avenue.

Alderman Johnson said that the Clerk has already written to Mrs. Pattison, pointing out that new equipment for the control of smoke is presently being tested on the Low Level Road. She said that additional equipment is being installed in one of the mills, on Wednesday of this week.

Alderman Johnson said that one item in the Company's letter is not correct, as the Fire Chief had said there was no indication of any wheat chaff on the premises of Mrs. Pattison when he had inspected it during the period referred to in the Company's letter.

Moved by Alderman Johnson, seconded by Alderman McMillan that the Clerk be instructed to write to Evans, Coleman & Evans Ltd., pointing out that new smoke control equipment is presently being tested at mills on the Low Level Road, and the Council hopes that as a result, the present smoke and sawdust nuisance will be greatly alleviated. Carried

From the North Vancouver Schools Band, requesting their grant of \$100.000 for the year 1954.

Discussion followed.

Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman McMillan that the 1954 Grant of \$100.00 be paid to the North Vancouver Schools Band. Carried

From the B. C. Electric Railway Co. Ltd., requesting permission to eliminate the north-bound stop on Mackay Avenue at 19th Street, because of its hazardous location.

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Copping that this request be referred to the Transportation Committee for consideration. Carried

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From the B.C. Electric Railway Co. Ltd., requesting that an east-bound nearside bus stop be established on Keith Road at Adderley Street.

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Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Bryan that this request be referred to the Transportation Committee for consideration. Carried.

From the Bank of Montreal, requesting a special parking area for their vehicles on Esplanade, adjacent to the 2 Bank Building.

Moved by Alderman Copping, seconded by Alderman McMillan that this request be referred to the Board of Works Committee to consider the possibility of establishing a loading zone to take care of the situation. Carried.

From Mrs. L. Ida Scudamore, 255 East 17th Street, requesting that traffic signs be erected at the intersection of 17th and St. Andrews, because of the number of accidents which have occurred at this intersection.

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Johnson that this request be referred to the Transportation Committee for consideration. Carried.

From Burrard Dry Dock Co. Ltd., requesting permission to paint two yellow lines across Esplanade, and erect two "Pedestrian Crossing, Stop When Occupied" signs in the middle of the 100 Block East Esplanade.

Moved by Alderman Copping, seconded by Alderman Bryan that, pursuant to the provisions of the Street & Traffic By-law, Superintendent Greenwood be authorized to erect two "Pedestrian Crossing, Stop When Occupied" signs in the middle of the Unit Block East Esplanade, such signs to be supplied by the Burrard Dry Dock Co. Ltd., to the City's specifications. Carried.

From the North Vancouver Business Association, advising that it will donate \$200.00 towards the cost of a Christmas Lighting Program.

Alderman Johnson said that we had agreed last year that we could not pay any cost of Christmas lighting this year. She said she had advised Mrs. Norminton, the Secretary of the Association, of the amount of the expense involved in this project. She thought that if each store decorated its own premises that the new lighting provided by the City would show up our shopping districts quite well.

She said the North Vancouver Library has a very good book on decorative lighting.

Alderman Johnson said she had asked the Electrical Inspector if he could decorate the City Hall, and he said he thought he could do it for about \$75.00, with the help of the Fire Hall. She said this would include the lighting of the tree on the City Hall grounds.

ing of the tree on the City Hall grounds. She said she thought that the question of lighting a tree at the bottom of Lonsdale should be a Ferry responsibility, and pointed out that if we did do so, then the Upper area will also ask for a lighted Christmas tree.

Upper area will also ask for a lighted Christmas tree. Alderman Johnson suggested that a letter be sent to the Business Association, advising that the City is unable to finance Christmas decorations as well as provide improved street lighting.

Discussion followed, with Alderman Suttis suggesting that possibly this matter should be referred to a Committee, to see if there is some other way of raising some money.

Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman Johnson that the question of a Christmasstreetlighting program be referred to the Fire & Light Committee, for further consideration.

Discussion followed.

The motion was then put and carried.

From James J. Larkin, 443 Lyon Place, requesting that street lights be left on later in the morning, because he said that on October 19th he had walked into puddles of water, at 6 a.m., in total darkness.

Alderman Johnson said she was very grateful to Mr. Larkin for his complaint, because it had given her the opportunity of seeing the street lighting control equipment in the B.C. Electric Sub-station. She said this equipment had been shown to her to-day. She advised that the contract with the B.C. Electric provides that the street lights shall be on from dusk to dawn. The equipment at the Sub-station is operated on what is known as an astral clock, which puts the lights on and off at the correct time, for a whole year. She said the trouble is caused when there is a black-out, and the North Shore is particularly susceptible to this, because of the large number of trees.

Alderman Johnson advised that a two-hour black-out had occurred on the morning of the 19th of October, resulting in Mr. Larkin's complaint.

Alderman Johnson said that the time of the rising and the setting of the sun is decided by the Astronomical authorities, and the clock is set accordingly. For example, the street lighting circuits are regulated for October 15, 25 and November 3 as follows:-

October 15th - Lights went on at 5:35 p.m. and off at 6:05 a.m. October 25th Lights went on at 5:15 p.m. and off at 6:20 a.m. November 3rd - Lights went on at 4:55 p.m. and off at

6:35 a.m.

Alderman Johnson said that the equipment of the whole Substation is checked every afternoon.

Moved by Alderman Johnson, seconded by Alderman McMillan that the City Clerk be instructed to advise Mr. Larkin of the method of controlling the operation of our street-lighting system, and that it be particularly pointed out to him that on October 19th, 1954, a black-out of the street-lighting circuits had occurred in the morning, resulting in his complaint. Carried.

A letter was received from the Town Planning Commission, asking for a meeting with the City Council to discuss the future site of the P.G.E. Railway Station. Alderman McMillan said that he had noticed that the Minister of Railways had written to the local Board of Trade, advising that he approved of the station site at the foot of Lonsdale Avenue.

Moved by Alderman Copping, seconded by Alderman Bryan that the Town Planning Commission members be invited to meet with the Council in Committee next Monday evening at 7 p.m., to discuss the location of the P.G.E. Station. Carried.

The Commission letter advised, among other things, that they did not recommend any definite site, but suggested the Queensbury Avenue location is one worthy of consideration.

The Clerk reported that this Special Meeting of the Council had been called to consider the following business:

- 1. Reconsideration and repeal, if deemed necessary, of a Resolution passed by the Council on November 1, 1954, extending the time for receiving tenders for the installation of traffic signals on Lonsdale Avenue.
- 2. Appointment of Court of Revision on 1955 Voters' List.
- 3. Any other competent business.

Traffic Signal Installation

The Clerk reported that an open quotation had been left with the Electrical Inspector on November 1, 1954, and had not been given to the Council for consideration at the Regular Meeting last Monday evening as the Electrical Inspector had advised that he was under the impression that the quotation had been left on his desk by the City Clerk.

The Clerk advised that this quotation, which had been handed to him by the Electrical Inspector on November 2, 1954, was opened and offered to instal the traffic signals proposed by the Council for a price within the budget which had been allowed for this item.

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Johnson that the quotation from Peterson Electrical Construction Co. Ltd. be introduced and read. Carried.

The Clerk then read the quotation from Peterson Electrical Construction Co. Ltd., offering to instal traffic signals to the City's specifications at 3rd and Lonsdale and at 15th and Lonsdale for the sum of \$1,373.85 at each intersection if one of the existing utility poles was utilized, and the sum of \$1,620.62 at each intersection if four new steel poles were used.

The Electrical Inspector was present and reported that the Company had been asked to make an alternative bid for the installation of these traffic signals using three steel poles and one wooden existing utility pole, or alternatively using four new steel poles. He said that he had written to the B.C. Electric Co. to ascertain if they would have any objection to the City using their utility pole, but he had received no reply except a 'phone call to the effect that, while the Company would allow the utility poles to be used for the traffic signal span wires, they would not allow the . pedestrian signal lights to be hung thereon.

The Clerk reported that the Supplementary Estimates of the City had been approved by the Department of Municipal Affairs, and these included the sum of \$4,500.00 as the City's share of installation of the traffic signals now under consideration. In addition, he said, the Provincial Government had promised to pay up to \$1,400.00 as its share of the traffic installation at 3rd and Lonsdale.

Moved by Alderman Johnson, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the resolution passed by this Council on November 1st, 1954, authorizing an extension of time to November 15th, 1954, for the receiving of tenders to instal traffic signals on Lonsdale Avenue, be reconsidered. Carried.

Moved by Alderman Johnson, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the resolution passed by this Council on November 1st, 1954, authorizing an extension of time to November 15th, 1954, for the receiving of tenders to instal traffic signals on Lonsdale Avenue, be rescinded. Carried.

Moved by Alderman Johnson, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the quotation of Peterson Electrical Construction Co. Ltd., dated November 1st, 1954, to instal traffic signals on Lonsdale Avenue in accordance with the City specifications, for the sum of \$3,241.24 be accepted, and the Mayor and City Clerk authorized to sign and seal with the Corporate Seal the necessary Contract for the work. Carried.

Moved by Alderman Johnson, seconded by Alderman Suttis that the Electrical Inspector be authorized to purchase immediately the necessary heads and controller equipment at an approximate cost of \$2,421.93. Carried.

She suggested the possibility of a grant to the Business Association to help them with their Christmas lighting. She said the City of Vancouver does not provide Christmas lighting on the streets, but it does supervise any installations on the streets. The City of New Westminster pays for Christmas lighting, while West Vancouver leaves it to the merchants to provide this illumination.

Alderman Johnson said she wondered if the City could find some money to make a grant to the merchants for Christmas lighting.

Alderman Johnson advised that the Merchants' Association had asked the City to extend the Christmas lighting up to 19th Street, and she said that this would amount to approximately \$2,500.00.

General discussion followed.

Alderman Johnson said that if we use our own equipment we can decorate the south side of the City Hall for about \$75.00, with help from the Fire Hall. She said she had brought this subject up at this Special Meeting because she was going to miss next Monday night's Committee Meeting on account of a previous engagement, and wanted to ask if Alderman Suttis could find any money for a grant for this purpose.

It was agreed that the Council would take this matter under consideration.

Council Indemnities

Discussion followed, with Alderman McMillan pointing out that although he was not too sure of the dimensions of the area to be leased, he would like to say that many months ago, the Health Unit had requested the Hospital for a deed to the portion of the Hospital Grounds, as they said they could not get a grant unless they had a deed. Eventually, however, the Board had told them again that they were prepared to lease some land to the Health Unit, and apparently now, because the Health Unit is on Hospital property, the Unit has ascertained that they would be able to get financial aid from the Government if a lease was given to them.

Moved by Alderman McMillan, seconded by Alderman Stewart that this matter be referred to the Legal Committee for study.

Further discussion followed. The motion was then put and carried.

A letter was received from School District No. 44, 2 enclosing copies of the proposed School Loan By-law, amounting to \$830,000.00.

General discussion followed.

Alderman Suttis remarked that the City should not be required to cut down on its other general services, because of increased school costs. He said we have got to the place where we must recognize there is a lot of work to be done, and we must get the taxes from the people, instead of trying to set a maximum mill rate and maintaining it.

Alderman Copping agreed, and referred to certain expenditures which the City was not able to assume, because of the lack of money. He thought the general idea of the School Board planning ahead was good, but the City should have some money left for general services.

Alderman Johnson agreed that we must have more school rooms, but thought the City should have something to say about the actual plans of the buildings. Mayor Cates pointed out that, as a member of the Indian Advisory Committee, he knew that schooling is a problem with the Indians, as well as with ourselves

Mayor Cates pointed out that, as a member of the Indian Advisory Committee, he knew that schooling is a problem with the Indians, as well as with ourselves, especially in the North country, where there are only two or three children. He said in such cases, the Indian Department looks after them by placing them in a public school, and a grant is made to the public school, of \$150.00 per annum, for each pupil. Mayor Cates said he did not think our people realized the cost of educating a child. He pointed out that he himself, if he had to pay for the total schooling of his own three children, would have to pay \$450.00 per year for their education. He said he was not against the increase in school costs, but said the people must realize that someone has to pay for it, and the work of our other departments should not be jeopardized as a result. He said our citizens should know they are going to pay a further considerable sum of money for these new school buildings.

The letter from the School District was ordered received and filed.

Letter was received from the Minister of Municipal Affairs, approving of the payment of \$100.00, out-ofpocket expenses to Mr. A. D. MacInnes, Chairman of the Board of Debt Retirement.

Moved by Alderman Suttis, seconded by Alderman McMillan that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the

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sum of \$100.00 to Mr. A.D. MacInnes, Chairman of the Board of Debt Retirement, for out-of-pocket expenses incurred by him to this date. Carried.

Letter was received from the Loyal Protestant Home for Children, advising that a total of \$11,176.90 was raised in the Lower Mainland on October 2nd, 1954, through their annual Tag Day, and that of this amount the City and District of North Vancouver contributed \$824.12. Ordered received and filed.

Moved by Alderman Stewart, seconded by Alderman Copping that this Council now adjourn.
